Record interest in community partnerships!

Busselton Water's commitment to the local community has seen a record nine local groups supported over the coming year.

In total, close to 20 local organisations and projects have received approximately \$30,000 since the Community Partnership Program began.

The third year of Busselton Water's annual Community Partnership Program received an enormous amount of interest with more than 20 local organisations and groups applying for support. In a record high, nine community groups will be supported by this year's Community Partnership Program and extend across all areas of the community.

The Busselton Toy Library was one of this year's successful recipients, now able to purchase water-related play toys for children under six thanks to the \$584 grant from Busselton Water.

Busselton Toy Library President Brady Van Wyk said this is the first time they've applied and were so grateful for Busselton Water's support.

"This is the first time we've been able to purchase water-based toys which will provide local kids with hands-on opportunities to explore water and the different ways water is a part of the world – it's a brilliant addition to our toy collection," Ms Van Wyk said.

THINKING GREEN

Our focus on driving energy efficiency across the business has seen us expand our bank of solar panels and take a new and innovative approach to securing a new energy partner.

In a first for Busselton Water, we used a specialist energy management company, EnerNOC, to assist us in engaging a new energy supplier.

"The energy market is complex and ever-evolving, so to have specialists who can use their expertise to advise us was tremendous. They were powerful negotiators for us and offered market insights, modelling and specialist advice along the way," Busselton Water CEO Chris Elliott said.

The resulting partnership with Alinta Energy is expected to reduce



electricity costs right across the business, which will ultimately benefit our customers.

In a further effort to reduce our carbon footprint, we also extended our partnership with West Australian Alternative Energy by installing 70 new solar panels on our Administration Centre building on Fairbairn Road. We expect to offset almost half of the power we use each year.

Project update

Our project team has been hard at work on the new pump station to provide water services to Busselton Margaret River Regional Airport. As it nears completion, onlookers may have noticed the walls go up for the pump house and the site active with heavy machinery.


Upgrades to the Kent Street water treatment plant have also hit the half way mark, with the original aged filters removed and the new filters set to arrive next month!

Both projects will play a key role in delivering reliable water supply for our growing region, and are expected to be completed by the end of the year.

How bo you ? measure up :

Starting each year on 1 July, Busselton Water 'resets' its customers' water consumption charges to the lowest rate per kilolitre of water. Householders are charged this rate until their cumulative water use reaches the next threshold, triggering the next higher rate per kilolitre to be charged.

We're now a third of the way into the year and we're asking – how do you measure up?

On average, each Busselton Water residential household uses around 270 kilolitres of water every year.

It's not too late to start thinking about how you can reduce your water use to save on your next two water bills," Mr Elliott said. "Water bills are made up of two components – water consumption and a supply charge. The supply charge is a flat rate, but water consumption is calculated from water meter readings three times a year – in October, February and June.

"The rate you are charged per kilolitre for your water increases in line with your cumulative annual water consumption. So at the end of the day, if you use less water throughout the year, you'll end up paying a lower rate for your water."
