

# A WAVE OF CHANGE

Busselton Water has launched its BYO Bottle program, providing its drinking fountains free-of-charge at community events to encourage event-goers to avoid single-use plastic drink bottles and instead refill their own reusable bottles.

"BYO Bottle is a terrific program and we're excited about the difference it can make – for event organisers and patrons, and

for our local environment," said Busselton Water Chair, Helen Shervington.

The Busselton City Football Club was the first to host the drinking fountains under the new program as it welcomed more than 400 people to its LiveLighter Busselton Soccer Carnival over the Queen's Birthday long weekend.

Carnival organiser, Sami Noakes, said that it's a great community initiative that helped to reduce waste and litter at the event.

"We were thrilled to be a part of building a more sustainable community in Busselton – and to showcase this commitment to the many teams joining us at the carnival. Offering free water to all of our visitors and players over the weekend is of course an added bonus as well!

"Working with Busselton Water to secure the fountains for our event was a smooth, easy process and we'd recommend that other local event organisers consider applying," she added.

#### WHAT'S IN A BILL?

Busselton Water bills are made up of two parts – your water consumption and a supply charge.

Your October water bill is generally your cheapest, because it's the first one for the new water year when your water consumption charge is reset back to its lowest rate.

1001+ kL **\$3.30 per kL** 701-1000 kL **\$3.22 per kL** 

501-700 kL **\$2.30 per kL** 

351-500 kL

\$1.74 per kL


151-350 kl **\$1.52 per kL** 

0-150 kL **\$1.09 per kL** 

All rates effective from 1 July 2019

Think of the year as a bucket, as the bucket fills up and hits a higher level, the consumption rate you are charged per kilolitre also increases.

Your supply charge remains the same for the entire year.



So why do our customers receive two bills – one from Busselton Water and one from the Water Corporation? That's because these organisations look after you in different ways. Busselton Water provides your fresh drinking water whilst the Water Corp looks after your sewerage.

### WATER-FRIENDLY REMINDER

Summer is on its way – but hasn't arrived quite yet. The two-day water roster however is in full force!

#### WATERING ROSTER

No.\* Your two watering days

1 Wednesday + Saturday

2 Thursday + Sunday

3 Friday + Monday

4 Saturday + Tuesday

5 Sunday + Wednesday

6 Monday + Thursday

7 Tuesday + Friday

8 Wednesday + Saturday

9 Thursday + Sunday

\*Last digit of your house/lot no.

Friday + Monday

To find your watering days, take the last digit of your house number and apply it to the water roster above, eg. 12 Rose Street – last digit of your house number is 2. Unit 3, 355 Rose St – last digit of your house number is 5.

If your property does not have an assigned house number please use the last digit of your lot number.

This two day roster does not apply to bore users in the South West however, bore users are required to adhere to the watering times.
