This book was specially crafted to celebrate National Water Week, an annual awareness week held to promote the protection of water as a precious resource across Australia.

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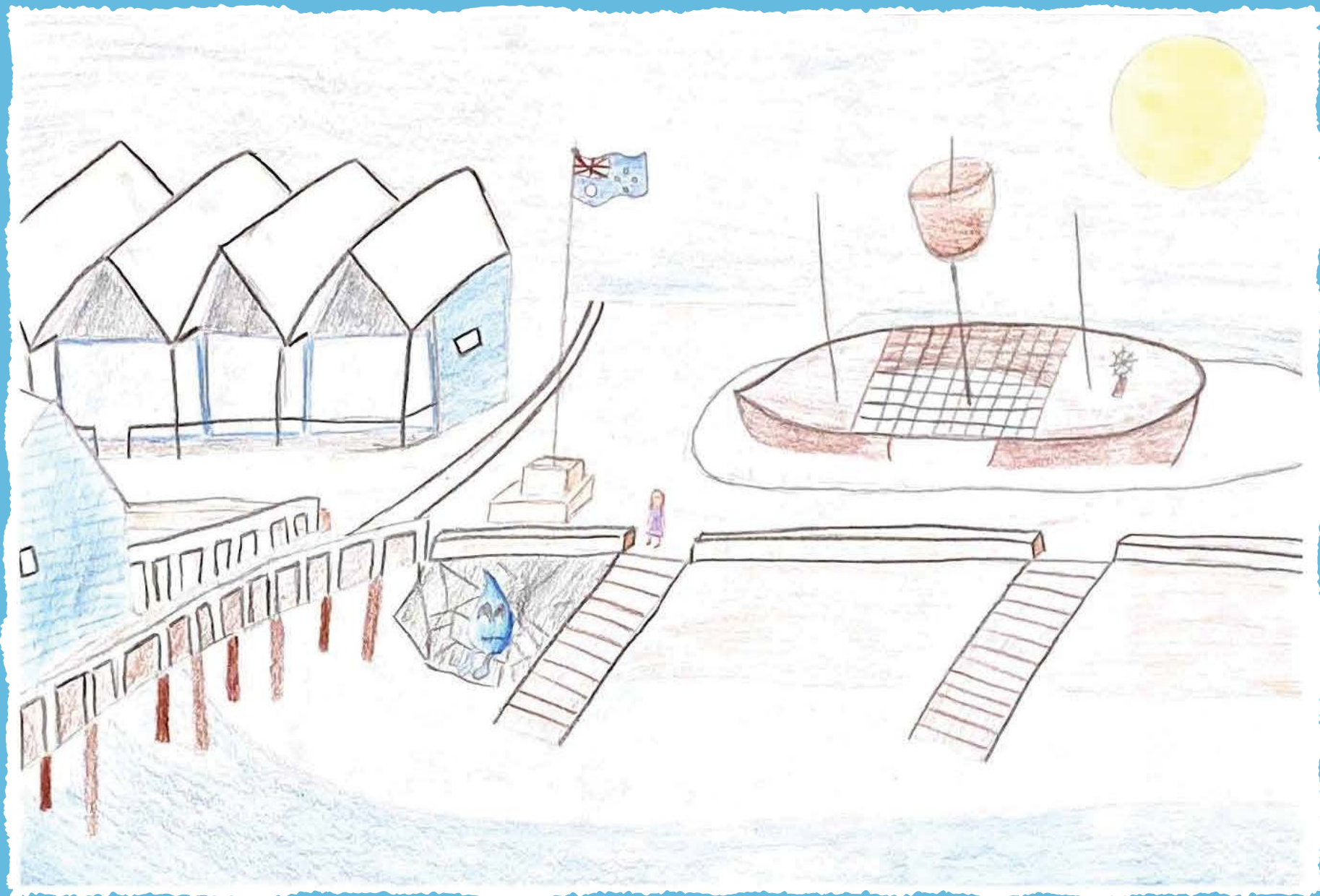
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HYDRO AND LILY SAVE BUSSELTON'S WATER

“What’s up Hydro? You don’t seem your normal self?” yelled Lily as she treaded through the deep warm sand around the pirate ship.

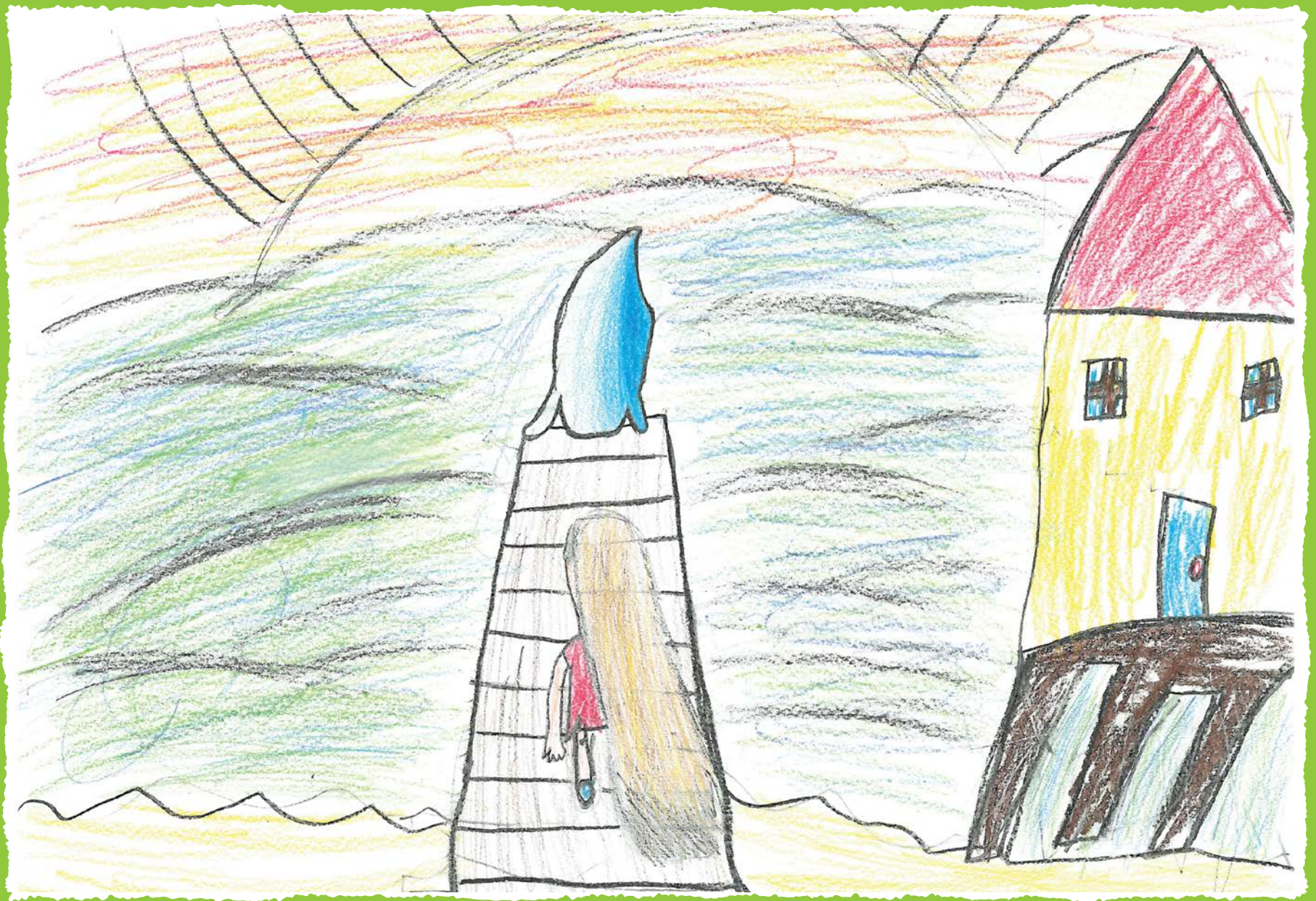
“I’m a bit worried Lily and I’m not sure what to do,” replied Hydro as he looked down at his blue feet.

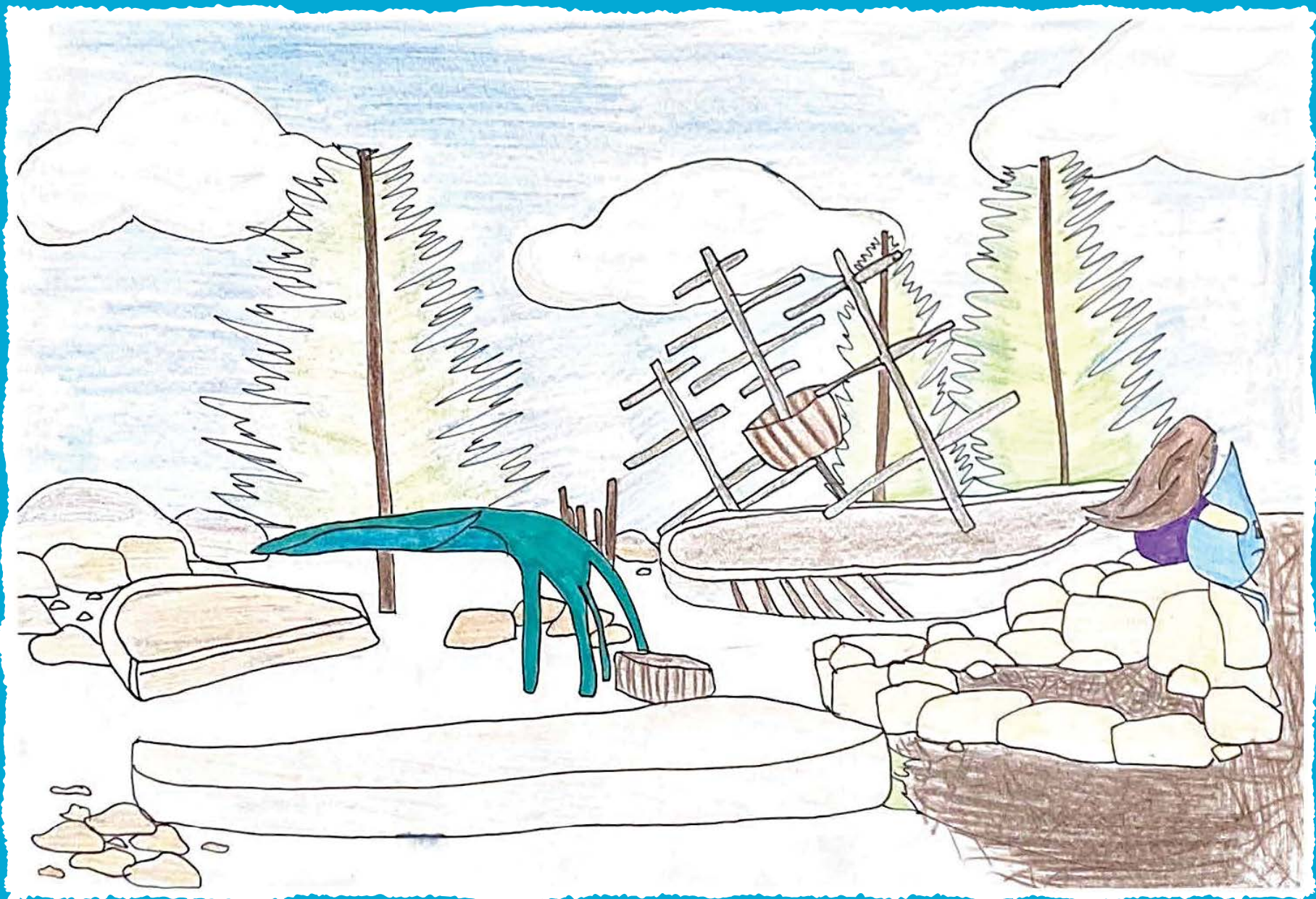
“What are you so worried about Hydro? Maybe I can help!” Lily said as she came and sat next to Hydro.

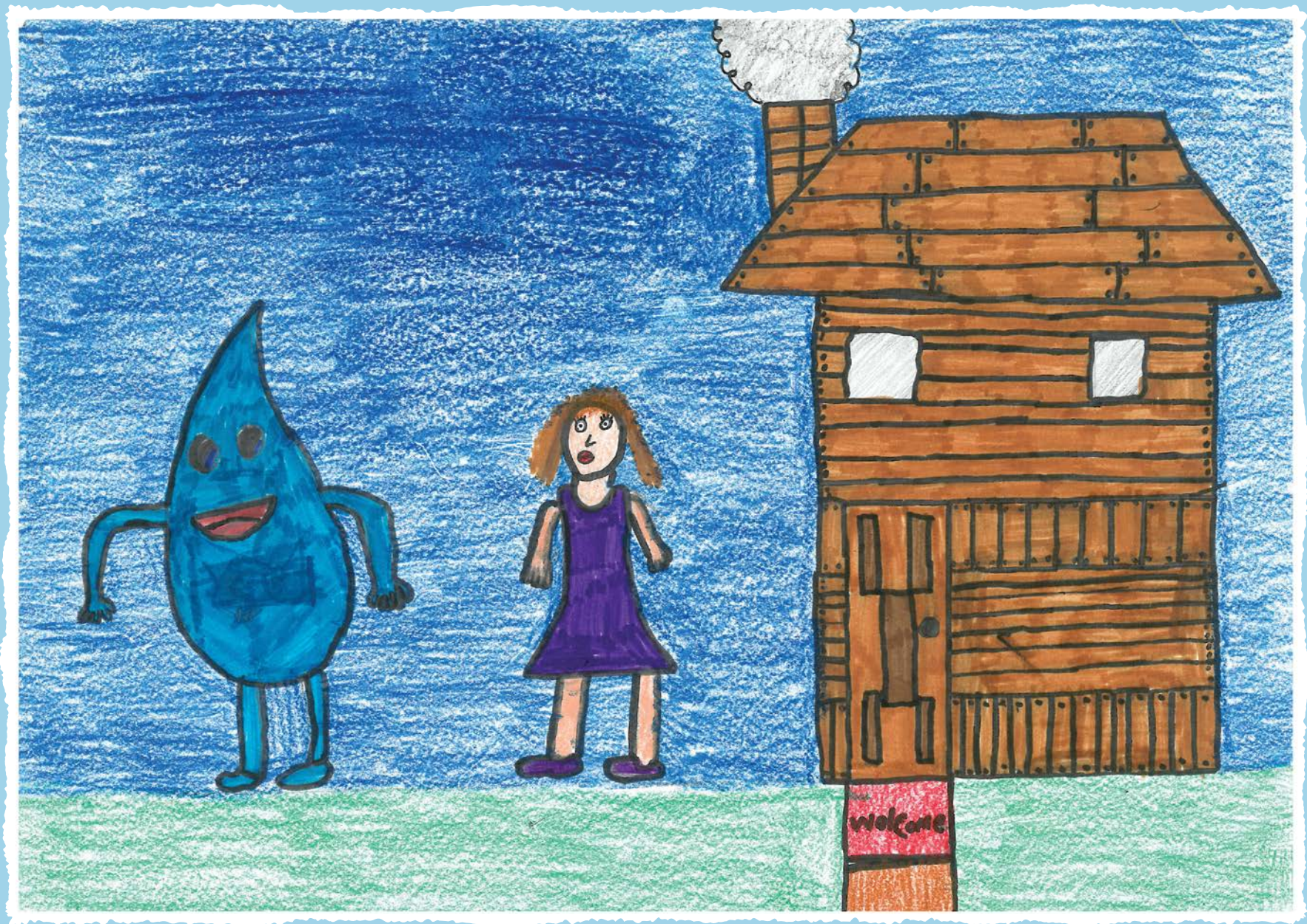
“So how do we stop the water from disappearing Ms Banks?” Lily questioned.

Groundwater. Most of Busselton's groundwater comes from the Yarragadee aquifer which is a major freshwater resource for the south west of Western Australia. It runs beneath the Swan Coastal Plain west of the Darling Scarp, from Geraldton to the south coast. The aquifer is situated hundreds of metres below ground and is around one kilometre deep.

The groundwater aquifers are replenished by rainfall and our drying climate means we need to monitor them carefully to protect our future reserves and make sure that salt water from the ocean doesn't find its way in.
