

It's time to FLICK THE SWITCH!



It's that time of year when the clouds open up and Mother Nature does our watering for us!

The state-wide winter sprinkler switch-off is now in effect and applies to all scheme and bore water users in Busselton. No sprinklers or reticulation may be used between 1 June and 31 August, so if you haven't done so already, it's time to turn off your retic!

The winter sprinkler switch-off helps to preserve our limited drinking water supply over winter when evaporation rates are low and there is usually sufficient rainfall to sustain lawns and gardens.

Although there are restrictions in place for reticulation use, hand watering is permitted with a watering can or hand-held hose – ideally either before 9am or after 6pm.

As Australia marked National Reconciliation Week 2022 earlier this month, Busselton Water embarked on its own journey with local visual artist, Cassandra Bynder.

A Ballardong Whadjuk Noongar and Yamatji woman, Cassandra (pictured right with Busselton Water Manager Customer Service Katie Jolley) has been selected to create a commissioned artwork for Busselton Water's Reconciliation Action Plan.

Based in Vasse, Cassandra is an experienced and award-winning artist whose work adorns the Yungarra Gallery in Dunsborough and a number of private collections around the country.

"I create visual art to express ideas and explore my psyche. My paintings often feature hands, faces, wildlife and flora from Wadandi Noongar Boodja," Cassandra said.

Busselton Water Managing Director Chris Elliott said he was thrilled to be able to engage an experienced First Nations artist from the South West region to deliver this important artwork.

"It is our hope that this artwork will follow a water theme that reflects the waterways of the Wadandi country. As a Whadjuk Noongar artist who grew up in the South West, we're confident that Cassandra understands the special place that water has in our region," he said.

The artwork is expected to be completed over the coming months.

Countering Climate change

Do you know where Busselton's drinking water comes from? If you're unsure, you're not alone.

A recent survey shows that more than a third of our local community is unaware that Busselton's drinking water comes solely from groundwater. That's right, our drinking water is drawn from the ancient Yarragadee aquifer, located hundreds of metres underground!

The Yarragadee is replenished by rainfall, as the water seeps down and is stored in the spaces between rocks and soil. Busselton Water extracts and treats this groundwater before distributing it to homes and businesses across our region.

Groundwater is a precious - and finite - resource, and it's under threat from the impacts of climate change. Global climate models show a drying trend for our region, with average rainfall projected to drop by up to 25% over the next 20 years. So, at a time when our community is growing, our water source is becoming more fragile.

One of Busselton Water's most important responsibilities is to plan ahead and ensure we have fresh drinking water available for generations to come. Over the coming months, we'll be sharing information with our customers about the work we're doing to combat the impacts of climate change so that together, we can better preserve and protect our community's future water supply.
