

LOCAL ARTIST BRINGS RAP TO LIFE



We are delighted to have commissioned acclaimed local artist, Cassandra Bynder, to create this stunning artwork for our Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) – depicting the waterways around Busselton and their important connection to life and the past and present inhabitants.

The painting, 'Beeliar kebitj bwooar nginy' which translates to 'The river runs through me' celebrates the rich web of life that depends on the local waterholes, rivers and oceans and the deep connection the local First Nations people, the Wadandi Noongar, have to the water.

Cassandra, a Ballardong/Whadjuk Noongar and Yamatji woman, said, "I wanted to explore what water means to the Noongar people, to all the indigenous people and to all people in general, and that is that water is life, and it brings life, and it is in everything."

Our RAP will guide us as we seek to develop a deeper understanding, build stronger relationships and raise cultural awareness as individuals and as an organisation.

KNOW YOUR DAYS!

Did you know that during the summer months we can use more than twice the volume of water than at other times during the year?

That's why it's so important to know and follow Busselton Water's watering roster which is in place between 1 September and 31 May each year. During this period each household has two rostered watering days, on which you may water once, before 9am or after 6pm.

Working out your rostered watering days is easy! Simply take the last digit of your house number and apply it to the watering roster – if your property doesn't have an assigned house number, please use the last digit of your lot number.

- 12 Rose Street last digit of your house number is 2 = watering days are Thursday and Sunday
- Unit 3, 355 Rose Street last digit of your house number is 5 = watering days are Sunday and Wednesday.


CULTURAL LEARNING & KEY

WATER TIPS

Did you know if every one of us saved two buckets of water a day for a year, together our community would save enough water to fill the Geographe Leisure Centre outdoor swimming pools 231 times?

So, how can you save two buckets?



In the kitchen

The average household uses between 21 and 31.5 litres per day to hand wash dishes. Swap to a water efficient dishwasher, which only uses 15 litres – you'll save one and a half buckets of water.



In the bathroom

Turn the tap off when brushing your teeth – you'll save more than one bucket of water.



In the laundry

Catch your grey water from the washing machine with a bucket and use it on your plants – you'll save between three to eight buckets of water per load.

Three talented young students have been named as the winners of Busselton Water's 2022 National Water Week art competition.

The trio were picked from 210 entries from students at Primary and Secondary schools across the Busselton area – with each entrant exploring their own relationship with water through words and art.

Yuchi Do took out the Secondary School prize with a stunning ink and watercolour creation depicting a small fish in a jar of water sitting next to a stream.

The Mary MacKillop College student described her relationship with water as: "Water can be anything. It can be cold, hot and warm. Water is an essential part of life and adapting to a new environment can feel like a fish out of water."

Also from Mary MacKillop College was one of the two Primary School competition winners, Sadie Palmer, who created a beautifully bright and colourful entry with lots of detail.

Her entry had a strong environmental message: "Water is a precious resource, and we use over 300 gallons a day and we need to help use less so we can survive."

Joint winner Mila Deery from Vasse Primary School also delivered a stand-out entry which was colourful, detailed and featured beautiful shading. Her water story message again focused on the environment: "Water is wonderful because it is vital to all our living species."
