IT'S TIME TO SWITCH OFF!

The winter sprinkler switch off is here, so it's time for all scheme and bore users to turn off garden reticulation.

The annual switch-off, from 1 June to 31 August, helps to prevent wastage of our precious water supply and save it for drier months. During this period no sprinklers or reticulation may be used.

Minister for Water Simone McGurk said, "With over 40 per cent of home water use in the garden, average households can significantly reduce consumption during winter, lowering their bill and contributing to a total saving of some 5 billion litres of water."

With almost 14,500 customers and 43,500 bills issued each year, Busselton Water is asking for your help to get cleaner and greener by switching to our convenient online service.

Signing up is quick and easy. Simply go to the Busselton Water website, hit 'Pay my bill', choose the electronic invoice option and follow the prompts. When you consider it takes 10 litres of water to produce one A4 sheet of paper, a small change such as moving your water accounts to e-billing makes a real difference.

Speaking of small change, as an added bonus Busselton Water is offering all its new e-billing customers a one-off \$5 rebate when they sign up. That's a cup of coffee on us!

You've got until the end of 2024 to sign up and claim your rebate and if you prefer or need to keep with paper billing - you still can.

Even very small leaks can waste a huge amount of water and money. Although our water loss in Busselton is lower than average, estimates suggest our community could save more than 17 million litres of water each year if we could detect and eliminate leaks.

Here's some tips to help check for hidden leaks:



1. Ensure no water is being used in your house by turning off all water appliances, such as washing machines and dishwashers and your reticulation.



- 2. Record the black and red numbers on your water meter last thing at night.
- 3. The next day before the water is used, record the black and red numbers on the meter again.
- 4. If the red numbers have changed, this test confirms there is a leak and further investigation is required.
